The consistent engagement underscores the importance of providing a safe and supportive space where refugees can address the challenges they face, mainly language barriers, gaining new skills, and finding their place to contribute fully to Britain.

About the Engage Project

The Engage Project is funded by the National Lottery Community Fund and was set up to help refugees and migrants adapt and integrate into British society.

Refugees and migrants are assisted in overcoming language and cultural barriers and creating the best possible homes for them and their families.

Through this project, Bradford African Community recruited 4 members of staff, and engaged 4 associates.

As part of the Engage Project, we delivered Citizenship classes, English for Speakers of Other Languages (ESOL) and English Conversation for Beginner courses as well as helping new arrivals with translation and interpreting.

Academies

We have delivered a number of other academies and training courses through the Engage Project, including:

Sewing Academy in partnership with Skills Network and Bradford College, enabling service users to gain the skills required to join the fabric and textile industries.



Hair Dressing Academy in partnership with Realise Training, enabling service users to go into the hair and beauty industry as well as make friends and interact with new people.

Entrepreneur Academy in partnership with Bradford University's Open Innovation Programme - supporting refugees with business ideas to develop their ideas and become self-employed.



Engage... with communities


The Engage Project has seen us deliver Homework Clubs to young people who are experiencing language barriers, to enable them to improve their literacy and math skills.

We have been able to deliver job search drop-ins for refugees to engage them in seeking employment. Some of our clients weren't able to access this at home, perhaps through lack of internet access or ICT literacy so this was vital for them.

Our dropping-in centre has served many individuals who were experiencing language barriers, and refugees, with welfare support, reading letters, coordinating special arrangements, housing issues, filling out forms and much more. No need for an appointment, they simply had to turn up and ask for help, and we delivered!

Working with health partners to deliver Health and Wellbeing workshops gave refugees and asylum seekers the opportunity to improve their health and connect with relevant services.

Public Activities







Bradford African Community, through the Engage Project, have been able to take part in numerous public events and activities.

This includes the Yorkshire Integration Festival, organised by Migration Yorkshire; UNIFY Festival organised by Bradford University; Refugee Week and Black History Month events!

We are also pleased to have been able to deliver the Holiday Activities and Food (HAF) Programme over Easter, Summer and Christmas holidays.

In conjunction with the Engage
Project, this enabled us to deliver
family cook-and-eat sessions, days
out around the district, and trips to
get to know the country (Leeds,
Bridlington, Scarborough,
Blackpool and beyond).

Young people from low income families (refugees) were able to take part in activities and events that promoted their physical and mental wellbeing, their development and their educational needs.
